Electric cooperatives are disappointed—but not surprised—that in September the Administration officially abandoned an all-of-the-above energy strategy for a new, all-but-one approach that effectively removes coal from the nation's fuel mix in the future.

Already worried about making ends meet, many of Mitchell EMC consumer-members cannot afford the significant increases in electric bills that this policy would trigger.

Historically, the price of coal remains affordable and relatively stable. The U.S. Energy Information Agency reports the United States has 236 years remaining of recoverable coal reserves. Coal generates 37 percent of the nation's electricity our biggest energy source by far.

Seems the Administration lets history repeat itself. We saw this all-but-one game in 1978 when Congress passed the ill-conceived Power Plant and Industrial Fuel Use Act. Never heard of it? Few have, but for several years the government banned natural gas for power generation. Yes, natural gas—the fuel source being sold to the nation today as a cleaner fuel option. With gas off the table, electric

co-ops were forced to choose between building coal or nuclear plants.

Back then, co-ops were in the midst of a major power plant building cycle. With few options, they invested heavily in coal-based generating plants in the late 1970s and early 1980s. Thankfully Congress repealed its mistake, but not for nine years.



Sweet Collards

Ingredients

- 1-2 bunches Fresh Collards
- 2-3 Tablespoons Molasses
- 1 Teaspoon Garlic Salt
- 3 Tablespoons Margarine

Directions

Thoroughly wash collards, and cut away thick stems. Tear or cut into fairly small pieces so they will drain better after cooking. If available, place in pressure cooker, and process 15 minutes. A pressure cooker tends to make the collards more tender. They can also be boiled in a regular sauce pan. Drain. Mash out all of the water you can. In large saute or frying pan melt margarine. (the amount of margarine, molasses, and garlic salt depends on the amount of collards) For one bunch of collards melt 3 tablespoons margarine (or 2 tablespoons olive oil if you prefer). Stir in 2-3 tablespoons molasses and about 1 teaspoon garlic salt. Once margarine is melted add drained collards. Saute until all remaining water has evaporated. Adjust molasses, margarine, and garlic salt to taste. Tastes great served with pepper sauce, sweet relish, or other favorite sauces.

This same recipe can be used with other greens.
